THE COLLEGE FINANCES

THE announcement of two benefactions in the last number of the Magazine calls attention to the financial position of the College, and readers may like to have a note from the Bursar on this subject. Colleges receive no subvention from public funds and their continued existence in their present form chiefly depends upon money derived from two sources, benefactions and revenue from undergraduates, which (though undergraduates may not always think so) we try to keep as low as possible. Towards the end of the year 1950 we received two notable benefactions.

The first was the Blake bequest, the residuary estate (after certain specific payments) of the late William John Blake, an old member of the College. Some \pounds 7,000 has already been received and about \pounds 3,000 more is expected to materialize when the estate is finally settled. The receipt of this money, left to the College without any restriction save that it be used 'for the general purposes of the College', has given us a capital reserve of great value. The last major item of College building, the Holywell front, was completed in the early 1930s and used up the last of the free reserves of capital: it was not till the end of 1933 that the overdraft incurred during the building of the Holywell site was paid off. Then began the slow business of accumulating a reserve: we received one bequest of £1,000, another of £2,000, and for the rest we saved when we could. We had just, rather proudly, told ourselves that we had built up a free reserve of capital of £20,000-wealthy Colleges would, of course, be horrified at so small a figure-when news came of the additional £,10,000 from the Blake bequest. Thus, thanks to benefactions and to our own past efforts, the College finds itself for the first time with a modest capital sum which is in its own control, and is not, for the moment at any rate, earmarked for expenditure on new buildings or major alterations. (The capital which provides the main endowment of the College and of the Baring Scholarships is in the control of the Trustees, or is held in special Trust accounts.) The interest on the capital is not large when measured against present-day expenses, but to a Bursar who began bursaring with a total income of roughly £120 from the corresponding source, $f_{1,000}$ or so is a sum to be viewed with a certain degree of satisfaction.

The second benefaction came from the Drapers' Company and it has enabled us to appoint an additional Fellow. The Company offered and the College accepted with sincere gratitude a gift of £20,000 payable as to £,2,000 in the year 1950 and thereafter £,2,000 a year for nine further years. This endowment is received into the newly constituted Hertford College Drapers' Company Trust Fund where the interest, but not the capital, may be used towards the stipend of a Drapers' Company Fellow in Modern Studies. We are a small College, whether we reckon by present accommodation, total available building site, or total endowment, and we neither wish to be nor could be much larger than we are: but our restricted finances would not provide for more than six full teaching Fellows and we needed a seventh. Thanks to the generosity of the Drapers' Company we have been able to proceed at once to the election of an additional Fellow, a step we could not have taken, without the gravest financial doubts, if we had been forced to rely wholly. upon our own existing endowments.

All this does not mean that we have ceased to be one of the poorest of the Colleges, nor that we have ceased to be hampered in all sorts of ways by lack of funds. It does mean that, thanks to two most timely benefactions, our financial outlook has been greatly improved. What the future holds, who shall say? Our position, even after receiving these two gifts, may well be shaky in a troubled financial future, but if it should prove to be so, our position without these gifts would have been precarious indeed.

WE have first to record the production in Trinity Term 1951 of *The* Shoemaker's Holiday: A Pleasant Comedy of the Gentle Craft, by Thomas Dekker. Rehearsals took place during much of the term in the open space behind the New Buildings before a small but enthusiastic audience of children. In the eighth week the play was presented in the Sheldonian Quadrangle, by kind permission of the Curators of the University Chest and other authorities. Unfortunately the weather was not very good, and attendances were not large enough to show a profit. The Society had, however, secured in advance the financial backing of the J.C.R., whose contribution was very helpful. Artistically the production was a great success, and John Smithard deserves congratulations. In a well-balanced cast George Schlesinger was outstanding for his playing of Firk. The Society very much appreciated the help of the Porter of the Clarendon Building, Mr. Oliver.

The visit to Stratford-on-Avon in Trinity Term was to see *Richard II*. Since seats near the roof precluded a view of much of the set, this year the Society will sit downstairs.

In the O.U.D.S. Drama Festival held in the Clarendon Press Institute in Michaelmas Term, John Smithard produced Shaw's Passion, Poison and Petrifaction, or the Fatal Gasogene.

Readings have been continued regularly during the year, including one, by invitation, with St. Anne's Dramatic Society. A cocktail party was held in Hilary Term.

Several Members of the Society have taken part in University productions during the year. The Hon. Secretary took part in the O.U.D.S.'s Mariage à la Mode; Mr. B. W. Ardin and the Hon. Secretary were in John Ford's 'Tis Pity She's a Whore for the E.T.C.; Mr. Smithard was a principal in the O.U.D.S.'s Christmas Pantomime; and Mr. R. M. Cooke has appeared in Miracle Plays in the University Church.

At the time of writing plans are being made for another outdoor production. With the renewed support of the J.C.R., a more rigorous control of expenditure, and better luck with the weather the Society should show a profit this year. It is hoped to tour with the Trinity Term production in the Long Vacation.

Though not affluent, the Society flourishes. A successful production this year will ensure its tradition.

ALTHOUGH the results of Eights were not as successful as had been hoped, both the first and second crews went up for the first time since the war.

For the first four nights the First VIII engaged in a duel with St. Peter's Hall II. This crew having been caught for the second time on the fourth night, the Eight rowed over on the fifth night and caught Oriel II on the last night of the races. The crew had promised well in practice but on two occasions during the week the Hertford 'jinx' overtook it with disastrous results.

The Second VIII were unable to catch the very powerful B.N.C. III crew, nearly all of whom were former First VIII colours, on the first three nights. On the fourth night, however, they caught Exeter III and New College III was caught on the sixth night after a thrilling race past the barges. The crew rowed well and they were unfortunate in having such a good boat in front of them for the first half of the week.

At the end of the Trinity Term J. M. Lister and R. J. Graham were elected Captain and Secretary respectively.

Prospects at the beginning of Michaelmas Term 1951 were distinctly unpromising. Only one member of the First VIII and three members of the Second VIII were available, and the number of Freshmen who attended the first meeting of the Club was disappointing.

After three weeks intensive tubbing a crew was put on the river with the help of third-year men, and during the fifth week these people were replaced by novices. The crew thus formed was to represent the College in Torpids and was to enter for the Long Distance Race in December only if its performance warranted such a step. However, in the three weeks before the race the crew, under the able coaching of E. J. Coode (Captain 1939-40) and J. C. Tyler, improved very much and in the actual race came 18th out of 28 boats with five first boats behind it. Considering the outlook at the beginning of term this performance was quite encouraging.

Those few Freshmen who were unable to get into the crew spent the term tubbing and rowing in the O.U.B.C. Leviathan.

In Hilary Term 1952 owing to lack of response it was quite impossible to enter a Second crew for the Torpids. The First Togger was coached by E. J. Coode and J. C. Tyler, and for the last ten days by D. R. Tristram of Merton.

The crew worked hard during training and there was much more life than in recent Hertford First boats. The races did not belie our high hopes and four bumps were made. At no time was the boat threatened by pursuing crews and it was rather unlucky not to catch Exeter on the last night. The spirit in the crew was very good and very refreshing in that a Hertford boat knew that it was superior to the other boats around it.

At the start of the season it was disappointing to discover the lack of Freshmen cricketers to swell the ranks of those members of last year's side who remained. However, after a defeat, but not a disgrace, by B.N.C. two comfortable victories followed, one against the Yorkshire Wanderers touring side. The annual Downing match was narrowly lost in a most exciting finish, the St. Catherine's and Merton matches both won conclusively, and the games against Cheltenham and Oxford City were both drawn with honours fairly even. Altogether quite a successful season with as many games won as were lost and quite a number of the team available for the 1952 season.

The batting during the term was not consistent although R. J. Heslop in particular and J. M. Guffick could usually be relied upon for runs. Both P. J. Whitcombe and W. S. Blackshaw strengthened the side on their few appearances for the College.

The brunt of the bowling was borne by R. J. Heslop and R. E. Groves who were both quite successful and inexpensive, with G. S. F. Wilkin when available, M. H. Blake and G. Cook in support.

This year, with an unusually large number of old colours still in residence, and a good response from the rugger-playing Freshmen, the college fielded its strongest XV for several seasons, and ended the Michaelmas Term as runners up to Wadham in the 2nd Division of the League. In gaining this long-awaited promotion notable victories were achieved over Balliol (10–0), Jesus (3–0), and Pembroke (16–13): the only defeats in the League were against Wadham (5–11) and St. John's (3–8), injuries having weakened the College team on both occasions. The annual match against Downing College, Cambridge, had to be cancelled on account of the weather, but in a good game we reversed last year's defeat by Alamein Company, Sandhurst, the College winning 18-3. Much of our success was due to the good form of J. M. Guffick in the centre, and D. Byford who led the pack well, while P. Bateman led the side confidently in the unusual role of full back. Notable among Freshman additions to the side were C. Fuller, C. S. Pyne, D. Bonney, and J. G. Flint, who were awarded colours at the end of the Michaelmas Term.

Greatly weakened by the absence of D. Byford, J. M. Guffick, and S. G. Richards who had gone down for the Hilary Term, the College struggled in Cuppers and with a bye into the second round won against Corpus (21-6) but was defeated in the quarter-final by a strong St. John's side (0-21). Atrocious weather caused the cancellation of most of Hilary matches, including once again that against Downing College.

Next year most of this year's pack will still be up, and with hoped-for Freshman three-quarters the College hopes to establish itself in the First Division of the League.

THE Club started the season under a severe handicap. The ankle injury which the Captain had incurred last year had not responded to treatment and restricted his activities to an occasional game in goal. Despite this the team started its Division I League programme successfully, and the first three games were won, although the two points obtained from one of these victories were later forfeited. Only one point was gained from the remaining four games, however, and the result was that the Club only just avoided relegation.

The Club began the Hilary Term well and at the time of writing is undefeated, having reached the Quarter Finals of 'Cuppers'. This revival has coincided with the return to the team of R. J. Heslop who, after playing for the O.U.A.F.C. for most of the Michaelmas Term, was very unfortunate to miss his 'Blue'. B. L. Balderstone, too, has been in good form, and in one round of Cuppers succeeded in scoring eight goals—surely an individual scoring record for the College.

There has been no lack of interest among the Freshmen, as is borne out by the fact that for one game a Second XI in the strict sense of the term was fielded! No fewer than ten Freshmen have played either for the First or Second XI during the season.

We congratulate P. J. Whitcombe on bringing the number of elected Centaurs resident in the College up to six and also B. L. Balderstone, W. A. Emerson, and R. J. Heslop on playing for the Centaurs in the Argonaut Cup competition.
