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College Notes.

NOTHING untoward has marked the opening of the new year. The number of Freshmen is smaller than last year, but not below the average. We believe, too, that the higher standard now required by the College is beginning to take effect, and we hope before long to see such an increase in quantity as well as quality as would justify the College in completing its buildings on the Holywell site.

Only two actual changes have taken place in the structure of the College since our last number. One of these supplies a long-felt need. The College has never possessed a room properly fitted out as a Common Room, but now the old Writing Room has been amalgamated with the smaller room immediately to its north, lecturers and their apparatus have been banished, and the whole has been furnished as a Club Smoking Room. The room is used exclusively for reading, writing, tea, and College meetings, for which last purpose its surprisingly ample dimensions render it very suitable.

The other change is a small one. Doubtless as a result of arguments in our last number, an additional bath has been installed in the New Buildings. We understand that the present heating arrangements will not admit of further baths except for psychrobaptists, and that it is not desired to alter these arrangements so long as there is a prospect of the deficiency being supplied by a further extension of the New Buildings.

While the new Barge last Term won general admiration, some criticism was called forth by the stunted appearance of its prow and the discomfort of its perpendicular staircase. During the Vac. these defects, due in the first place to a miscalculation of the space available, have both been remedied, and the Barge as she now floats is generally admitted to rival any on the river. We only hope the Eight will soon do the same.

Although Hertford's representation in the 'Greats' class list is less good this year than it might be, the general level of efficiency in the Schools is well maintained by the compensating glory of four Firsts in Mathematics—one in Finals and three in Mods. In the lower classes of this school the College is unrepresented. The Senior Tutor must blush when he does an addition sum with the numbers of Firsts gained by the College in the various Mathematical class-lists during the last fifteen years or so.

Our record in the Civil Service Exam. shows a great falling-off, C. H. Gidney being the sole representative—to whom many congratulations.

Of the Eights' Week Concert an account will be found elsewhere. Although financially it just failed, artistically it was a complete success. The Committee had the ill-luck to select for the concert what was probably the wettest night in the finest summer we can remember. Though the thunder gave realistic, if unrehearsed, effect, we can find no excuse for the rain, which both spoilt the illuminations in the Quad, and impeded the arrangements for supper.

The illumination of the College on the night of the Coronation was simple and, we thought, very effective. No attempt was made to rival some of our neighbours in crowns and portraits of His Majesty.

The lack of correspondence in this number suggests that there is very little at present to complain about. We can, however, think of one or two little things:—

The Library might be open after Hall.

One of the empty basement rooms in the New Buildings might be assigned to men who are in lodgings, as an apodyterium.

The flowers in the Common Room window boxes might spend their old age elsewhere.

The post and messenger services might clear letter boxes outside the Writing Room and in the New Buildings.

An Essay Club might be started.

The College Detachment of the O.T.C. was at the top of its form in the summer, and shows every prospect of flourishing this year under its new leader. The total numbers remain much the same, but it is to be regretted that comparatively few Freshmen have joined. Unless this is remedied there will be a heavy decrease next year. It is not to be expected, and possibly not desirable, that every member of the College should join the Corps, but those who do not belong include many who could be of real service in the war which everyone must now admit to be a near possibility. It will be a pity if the O.T.C. is found wanting when for the first time the country has some use for it.

We understand that a few more subscriptions towards the new Barge would be welcomed, but in a very short time the Consolidated Funds Committee should be free to consider its future policy. We hope that from the first this will take a definite shape. A cricket and football ground is a more expensive thing than a Barge, but it is what we want most now.

The suggestion made in our last number that after taking their Schools members of the College should present some of their books to the Library, has met with a gratifying response.

We have particularly to thank G. M. Robertson and J. N. Panes. The former can hardly have sold any of his books. We hope the practice will develope.

At a college meeting held on June 18th, the following officers were elected:—*Head of the College*: C. J. S. WRIGHT. *Secretary*: I. P. F. CAMPBELL.

A well-attended College meeting was held on November 2nd, to discuss various questions connected with the new Tea Room; also to revise the list of newspapers and periodicals taken in. The reform carried out in this respect has been generally welcomed, though there seems to be some regret that *Truth* has been abolished. A much-needed improvement in the notepaper, &c., has been promised for next Term.

Owing to lack of support and to a financial loss on the last two concerts, the Smoking Concert, fixed for November 22nd, did not take place.

Congratulations to I. P. F. Campbell on being elected Secretary both of the O.U.A.F.C. and the O.U.C.C. for 1911-12. It is interesting to note that he headed the Varsity cricket averages last season, and played for the Gentlemen *v.* the Players in the Long Vac. He also made some good scores for Surrey. He was idolized in *The Isis* of October 28th.

Congratulations to K. T. Hamilton on a place in the Trial Eights. C. J. S. Wright and J. C. Williams-Vaughan were also tried, but failed to survive.

Congratulations to J. F. Sidebotham on being elected Secretary of the O.U. Lacrosse Club, and to P. N. G. Fitzpatrick on representing the University against Cambridge as first string in the Quarter-mile Swimming, and thereby obtaining a Half-Blue.

P. N. G. Fitzpatrick played in the Seniors' Rugger match, and H. C. Joyce in the Seniors' Hockey. To the Freshmen's

Soccer match Hertford contributed B. J. Scott and C. W. Sanger, and W. H. A. Preece to the Freshmen's Hockey.

H. C. Joyce has been playing Hockey for the Varsity, while in Soccer we have been represented on one occasion by R. C. H. Kingdon, and on many by B. J. Scott in goal.

G. T. Gravell was invited to play for the University Rugby XV at the beginning of Term, and would very likely have found a place in it. Unfortunately his injured knee still prevents his playing.

It is a matter of regret that the College has been unable to raise a team to enter for the Inter-College Athletic Sports under the new scheme. It is surely better to raise a weak team than none at all.

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Hertford College Hop-Picking Settlement.

The Committee chosen at a College meeting last year to consider the question of establishing a settlement in Kent during the hop-picking season made arrangements for an encampment on Crowhurst Farm, Peckham Bush (near Paddock Wood), where one or two members of the College had been in the previous year. Including babies, some four or five hundred pickers are encamped annually on this farm, and in the middle of the pickers' camp the College pitched a few bell tents and an elderly marquee, which were kindly lent.

Owing to the hot weather, picking began a fortnight earlier than is usually the case, and as a result, several who had intended to come were prevented by other engagements. All things considered, however, the attendance was very satisfactory for a first year, and as all who came propose to come again, there ought next year to be a considerable increase.

There is no space here to discuss at any length the work done in the camp. Apart from a few gipsies, the pickers in ordinary life are mostly casual labourers in London. They include no aliens. As a class, they lack ambition and initiative: they do not put cleanliness in its recognised place among the virtues: they are woefully ignorant of the best ways of looking after themselves and their children, but they are almost all full of fun, candid and confidential.

In Kent they are without certain institutions on which they usually depend: for instance, they have neither policeman, parson nor doctor. Nor is there any provision, other than two inns, for their social entertainment in the evening. These

gaps the College settlement attempts in an entirely unofficial way to fill or rather to occupy. It also takes round refreshments, which are sold at a low price to the pickers while at work.

Thus there is any amount of work to do which is really of some use, but undoubtedly the greatest attraction of the settlement is the opportunity which it offers of getting to know on what is practically its holiday, and in its most confiding mood, a section of the population which is but little encountered in Oxford, and which can nowhere else be studied so easily or so pleasantly.

It is not proposed to raise a College subscription for the settlement. Living in the camp is simple and cheap, and the sum of one pound a week paid by each visitor covers all personal expenses. On the other hand a certain amount of plant is still required if the College settlement is no longer to be dependent on outside charities and loans; in particular, there is need of some tents, a wooden shed, and a specially constructed barrow for conveying refreshments about the fields. Sundry small objects are also required, a list of which can be had on application. This year the Church of England Hop-pickers' Mission very kindly made a grant of £7 10s.

The following members of the College visited the camp:— W. W. Ward (three weeks), H. C. Joyce (two weeks), N. Whatley, R. H. Brinsley-Richards, W. E. Price, B. J. Scott and R. L. Hardy (for shorter periods). Mr. T. V. G. Gilfillan, of Christ Church, gave valuable assistance during the first fortnight, and, finally, the Rev. J. McL. Campbell was present throughout, and superintended all arrangements. To him the success of the camp is chiefly due.

The Eights' Week Concert was held in Hall on Tuesday, May 30th. By kind permission of the *Oxford Magazine* we reprint the following account:—

'Hertford College is to be heartily congratulated on the success of its Eights' Week Concert. Both the programme and the performance reflected the greatest credit on all who were concerned in its production. This was the more gratifying inasmuch as the greater part of the performance was undertaken by members of the College themselves. All those who were present showed that they thoroughly appreciated the excellent programme, the only fault of which (one not unusual at these functions) was that it tended to err on the side of undue length. The College Musical Society, under their indefatigable conductor, Mr. B. C. Allchin, thoroughly justified their first appearance in public. Though they tired a little at the end, they sang with great spirit and at times with great delicacy, some of their soft tone in the madrigals being especially good. Their most ambitious effort was in the first set of *Liebes-Lieder* Waltzes by Brahms, with accompaniment for piano duet; but perhaps the work in which they did themselves greatest credit was Cornelius's magnificent aria, "Die Vätergruft," for baritone voices and chorus unaccompanied, a really difficult piece of music. The solo part was taken by Mr. Thornley Gibson, late of New College, whose fine voice and really artistic singing made us hope for great things in *Der Freischütz*. He also sang a delightful group of old English tunes and some modern songs. Mr. Spurr's distinguished musicianship was heard at its best in Fauré's fine "Elégie" for 'cello and his technique in a sonata by Boccherini; while Dr. Allen and Mr. Ley played a delightfully fresh duet for two pianos by Mozart. Those who doubt whether College Musical Societies are "worth while" must have gone away with their doubts entirely removed. They need hard work and enthusiasm to keep up, but there can be few societies better worth the trouble.'

HERTFORD COLLEGE DETACHMENT.

The detachment started this year with the loss of several of its most prominent members. Naturally the greatest loss is that of J. H. Driberg, our late sergeant. His keenness and efficiency were splendid. In spite of the fact that he was in for the I.C.S. exam. in the summer, he spent the whole fortnight at camp, a fact which speaks for itself. In short, Driberg was a thoroughly worthy successor to Evan-Jones.

At the time of writing the strength of the College detachment shows a decrease on last year's numbers. This year's Freshmen have not shown any distinct tendency towards military keenness. However, it is to be hoped that some of them will join later.

Our strength at present is 1 officer, 6 N.C.O.'s, and 29 cadets. There are also 2 members in the Cavalry and 2 in the Signallers.

As regards efficiency in drill, most of the members attained to quite a good standard. The attendance at camp was only moderate, but a variety of causes contributed to this. Attendance at field days has not been very large, but of course one cannot expect to turn out full strength in Term time, though the numbers certainly might be materially increased.

Several members of the detachment have entered for the Certificates 'A' and 'B,' but no results are yet announced.

The College entered a team for the Bourne Cup Competition last June, and came out third, Keble winning the Cup and Magdalen being second. Only a very few points separated the three first teams, but the marks were not published. It was disappointing having to own defeat for

the second time, but greater efforts must be made this year, so that we may make certain of winning the Cup at last.

In camp we sent in a team to shoot for the Morrell Cup; we beat Jesus II. and Corpus Christi, but succumbed to Oriel, who proved the ultimate winners. The team consisted of:— S. Norie-Miller, R. C. On the whole last season was by no means an unsuccessful one from the point of view of results: but, owing to many matches being unavoidably scratched, less than half those on the fixture card were actually played. The team was rather handicapped by some of its members being unable to play in several matches owing to the close proximity of Schools. On account of a careless oversight on

the part of the assistant secretary, the team was not entered for the tournament for the Inter-College Cup.

Of the play of the team as a whole, its chief defects lay in a general lack of consistency, weakness overhead, especially on the 'smash,' and a disinclination to make sufficient use of the side-lines. The combination, too, of the first and third strings, was by no means as good as it might have been, but this arose very largely from the members being unaccustomed to one another's play.

Without doubt, the loss of last season's captain and secretary will considerably lower the strength of the team, but, by the advent of W. C. Vogt, who succeeded in reaching the final stage of the Freshmen's Singles, the team's prospects have been appreciably brightened. During next season, if sufficient courts and players are available, it is proposed to run an 'A' team, with a regular programme of about two matches per week, in order to give many of those who do not usually play for the College an opportunity of regular match-play.
