False: Colleges are 'homes' - what might be right for you might not be for someone else. Students receive the same teaching & exams across the University.





















The majority of students at Oxford and Cambridge pay for their degree with their own money.









The majority of students at Oxford and Cambridge pay for their degree with their own money.

Work: in the holidays or during term time, depending on your university



#### REPAYING YOUR LOAN



Salary	Amount of salary from which 9% will be deducted	Annual repayment	Monthly repayment
£27,2950	£27,295 - £27,295 = £0	£0	£0
£30,000	£30,000 - £27,295= £2,705	£2,705x 9% = £243.45	£20.29
£35,000	£35,000 - £27,295 = £7,705	£7,705 x 9% = £693.45	£57.79
£50,000	£50,000 - £27,295 = £22,705	£22,705 x 9%= £2,043.45	£170.29


You do not have to pay back a 'bursary'.







- Students at Cambridge & Oxford study for around 60-70 hours a week False – 'full time job' = 35-45 hrs/week
- 'Tutorials' are where you get whole class feedback.
   False tutorials at Oxford are 1-1 or small-group teaching, and at Cambridge this teaching is called a 'supervision'
- You don't need to decide on a career path before you choose your degree. True – you are supported at University through the Careers Service & tutors to work out & develop your career aspirations
- You do not have to pay back a 'bursary'. True this money is given by the University/college, and you do not have to pay it back










# I KNOW I WANT TO STUDY HUMANITIES







Try to take at least one of: English Literature, History, Maths or a Language.



Supplement with other written, academic subjects such as Geography, Psychology, Economics, Sociology.




Or take other academic subjects, like Sciences & Further Maths, or arts related to your degree, such as Art or Music.











# I KNOW I WANT TO STUDY SCIENCE



Two, ideally three, of: Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics.



If Maths is a course requirement, then Further Maths is a useful addition.



There are often specific requirements for Science courses e.g. Chemistry for Medicine.




