Thank you once again, and I look forward to welcoming you home soon.









Each year, Hertford spends over £100,000 on outreach activities, ensuring that a Hertford education is accessible to all. A donation of £500 would provide a travel bursary for a school to visit Hertford.

Hertford spent over £130,000 on undergraduate bursaries in the 2021-22 academic year. A donation of £1,000 – or £70 a month plus Gift Aid – would fund one undergraduate bursary.

Graduate scholarships represent the next frontier in our pioneering approach to access, and we are broadening support for international students. Our Ukrainian Scholarship, for example, costs £25,500, and covers food, accommodation, stipend and a full fee waiver.


I joined University of Oxford and Hertford College in September 2020, in the middle of the COVID pandemic. In the previous years I was trying out research internship positions at various institutions around the world, figuring out what I wanted to do, and ultimately I selected an academic path. I have always found research a way to be free to continue working on projects of interest, but at the same time to have some supervision, guidance and even pressure from great people.

At the beginning of my research journey, I was firmly decided to pursue Machine Learning, and this was where I pivoted to after finishing my master's degree. I saw the application possibilities for this everywhere, including some very exciting and experimental areas, such as in using AI for Arts, or in automation of systems for the betterment of the world. But that is all easier said than done, and as such I was a little bit lost during my first year at Oxford University.


I owe my thanks to my supervisor Andrew Markham from the Computer Science Department, who has both the patience and the knowledge required to properly supervise his DPhil students. In this sense I really value the research community at University of Oxford. The quality is

very high, so that you can't get away with a sub-par job, but it is also humane and personable which helps when students (inevitably) get stuck.

A large shift in my research came with my internship at the Frontiers Development Lab, which consists of eight-week long research sprints during summer. We assembled a group made of researchers from around the world, exploring the topic of AI deployment on-board of satellites. We set out several initial ideas, including an on-board change detection system that could detect any type of (vaguely defined) "interesting" changes. This was dubbed as a "holy grail" by one of our advisors from ESA, and as it didn't seem too unfeasible we immediately went for this task. In the end we

At this point I would like to mention the beneficial impact of Hertford College on my life during my studies at Oxford, and how grateful I am to the donor who supported my scholarship designed a system that detects all types of changes and can use the inspection of human experts to assign labels, combining autonomy and human control. This work was finally published in the Nature Scientific Reports journal just a few weeks ago (check it out here: https://www.nature.com/articles/s41598-022-19437-5).

At this point I would like to mention the beneficial impact of Hertford College on my life during my studies at Oxford, and how grateful I am to the donor who supported my scholarship. As a DPhil student, the amount of exposure to other students (even from one's own department) is rather limited. This is where the collegiate system excels, in creating a community which one can belong to. Besides getting to know people, who are now among my best friends, it is also a space for more communal activities. Given my interest in the arts, I became the Art Representative for our college, and despite having very little free time (not to speak of free energy!) I managed to organise a couple of weekend trips into galleries around Oxford and London. Despite these being difficult to organise, I always felt recharged after these trips. This would be the kind of activity I would try to do own my own, but sharing it with some known and some new people from the wide community at our college was much better.



Perspective

My late husband read Physics and Philosophy at Hertford College, having won a Meeke Scholarship to do so. His own work was in technology, in the Cambridge hi-tech sector, theoretically underpinned by Physics of course, and he was a Chartered Physicist.

We don't have children, but there is nothing to stop us having 'virtual godchildren': young people of intelligence and dedication, on the path to achievement in the noble discipline of Physics. I am helping them by funding (one at a time!) graduate scholarships in Physics, in my late husband's name. He would have loved that, having been the recipient of a scholarship himself. Being at Oxford meant a lot to him, and I would like to keep his connection with Oxford alive.

If I could leave a couple of suggestions and tips for future students at the end of this report, I would encourage people to go out of their comfort zone and to try one of the student roles in the MCR. For those on a similar academic path, I would recommend the accredited Advancing Teaching and Learning Programme (ATL), run by the Centre for Teaching and Learning at Oxford. It is basically a class for people who want to get better at teaching, presenting academic theories, and encouraging one's own self-reflection about teaching.

BRIDGING THE DIGITAL SKILLS GAP

The UK is facing a digital skills gap, and the tech sector as a whole has an ongoing diversity problem. But our society needs people from a wider range of backgrounds to embark on tech careers. This isn't just important

from the perspective of raising aspirations amongst young people; diversity of thought and experience is crucial in ensuring that output is truly representative and works for everyone.

Some of Oxford's neighbourhoods are among the 20% most disadvantaged in the country, with 29% of children in Oxford living below the poverty line. Hertford's Code Club, generously supported by Clifford Chance, was designed to give them the skills, confidence, and technology they need to open the door to a career in tech. Our goal was to

increase the proficiency

most disadvantaged in the country and confidence of participants, and to encourage them to consider STEM subjects and careers.


The pilot programme for the Code Club ran as weekly sessions in school term times at Barton Neighbourhood Centre. 13 young people aged 11-12 registered for the club, of whom over half had never or only rarely attended an event to do with science in Oxford Sessions were managed by Hertford's STEM Outreach Officer as well as two undergraduates per session from a team of five. In addition to the core course, the group spent a day at Bletchley Park, exploring how early computer coders including Alan Turing created some of the first computers to break the Enigma codes.

Reflecting on the course, participants indicated that their knowledge of coding and self-confidence in problem solving had increased, with a tentative shift towards an openness to STEM careers in the future. Most importantly, the participants enjoyed the course, returning week after week to an optional after-school activity, meaning that all participants were allowed to keep the tablet they had used during the course – this was their reward for completing the programme!

We hope to be able to re-run the course, with 'graduates' from this programme supporting some of the sessions. From their participation to date, there are plenty who would be capable of doing do.







Did you know...


Hertford is rare amongst Oxford colleges for having had library provision for much of its centurieslong history; the first recorded reference comes in 1496, with 4/6d spent on plumbing repairs above the library in Hart Hall. Hertford's library underwent many iterations over the years. The last purpose-built library, built by Henry Wilkinson in 1656, had a set of rules and regulations that included the exhortation that library users 'shall silently & quietly apply [themselves] to study'.



The Benefactors' Books from Magdalen Hall's early modern library record the growth of the collections through donations. In recognition of the generosity of the donors to the current project, we will create a new Benefactors' Book to record donations to the current library project.



Additionally, there are 4,000 items in the rare books collection, many dating from the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, with a particular focus on science, geography and travel. The earliest manuscript in our collection is the Secretum Secretorum of Louis the Great of Hungary, dating from the 14th century.



There are 45,000 books in the modern collection, including most recently Fellow Librarian Professor Emma Smith's *Portable Magic*, which became the 70,000th book to have been accessioned. If the modern collection was laid end to end, it would run to around 1.3km, which is roughly the distance from Catte Street to the Graduate Centre



Highlights from the archive include building plans and drawings by renowned architect TG Jackson and the Buttery Books, which offer a fascinating insight into life in the early modern period.



As the college has grown, demand has outstripped supply. In the early 1900s, when the library first moved into its current location, Hertford had 30 new matriculants each year; now, we have 250.



Today's library is open 24 hours a day and is the backbone of many students' experience of college. In addition to the space and physical collection, our dedicated library team plays a crucial role in supporting students and helping them achieve their academic potential.



Perspective

The library is the mind and the soul of Hertford College. I have many memories in the library. This is where I wrote many exam papers, formed ideas, expanded my intellectual reach, and learned how to think on my own feet. 20 years later, I returned to the same library to research for my book which articulates the depth of technological transformation.

I want to contribute to a special place where many generations of students will build their own memories, form their own new ideas, and expand their own intellectual reach when they will sit at Clara's desk, flooded with natural light and inspiration. The theme of this year's Donor Report is 'looking to the future'. It's an apt theme because without the support of our alumni both past and present, the future would look very bleak indeed. This year, for the first time, over 1,000 of you made a donation to Hertford. It's that collective effort that keeps us going, and this report celebrates the impact of every gift, large or small.

I'm sure lots of you are familiar with this Greek proverb, which I confess to having borrowed from Will Hutton's final Donor Report in 2020: 'A society grows great when old men plant trees under whose shade they shall never sit.' There have been many different articulations of this throughout the ages, but the basic principle remains

the same. 'Old men' aside, it's still a relevant metaphor for the support shown by our alumni, many of whom are supporting funds or projects that may not have existed when they were at Hertford, and from which they will not directly benefit.

In an increasingly uncertain, even volatile, world, there's no doubt that we are in choppy waters. Indeed, this is the first year since 2015 that we have seen a drop in our income, and the first year since 2017-18 that we have banked less than £1m, although as Tom Fletcher writes elsewhere in this report, we have a transformational pledge in the pipeline. Fundraising is notorious for its ups and downs, and as we lurch from pandemic to recession. we must plan for a bumpy road ahead. But challenging though this year has been, we have built some real momentum and laid the groundwork for success in years to come. We will be launching a number of new initiatives in the coming months, including peerto-peer fundraising schemes and a renewed young alumni programme. There will be lots of opportunities for everyone to get involved at whatever level they feel comfortable with.

Often, when making a gift, donors will say in an apologetic tone that, "it's not very much." It's true that most of our income comes from a small number of donors who have the capacity to make a large gift. But it's also true that much can be achieved through collective effort, and it's the smaller gifts that keep us ticking over. Another frequently heard comment is: "this will just be a drop in the ocean" - but what is an ocean without all those drops?

Every year, student fees and domestic income represent a relatively stable income stream which fluctuates very little year on year. Our investment income is a little less certain, and trading income (events and conferencing) is more volatile still. But when these sources are taken together, we are usually left with a funding gap of around £1m. Every single donation we receive helps us to close this gap, meaning that we can budget effectively and reliably plan expenditure from year to year. This supports our students and Fellows in numerous ways, and has a real impact on the life of the college.

As the economic situation continues to bite, we know that many of you will have tough decisions to make. We hope this report makes clear how deeply we appreciate the decisions that you make, and the impact they have on Hertford's future. Together we can achieve so much

Hertford 2030 captures a vision for the future, with student wellbeing and quality of education at its heart. Excellent facilities and world-class teaching give our students the confidence and knowledge to succeed in life. We champion equality, sustainability, debate, and critical thinking, and we rely on the Hertford alumni community to help us achieve that.

Gifts in wills are vital to Hertford and help us to secure this vision. And it's clear that others recognise the importance of legacies too. According to Smee and Ford, the UK's leading provider of legacy information and insight, 16% of estates with wills in 2022 included a gift to charity. It is estimated that the total value of these legacies came to £3.5bn, and that figure is set to rise in coming years as more people discover the benefits of including charitable benefits in their wills. Our alumnitoday have a perfect opportunity to plant a seed for the next generation.

At Hertford, legacy gifts tend to range anywhere from £1,000 to the high six figures.
