Of course, college life will barely pause as we shift into summer mode, umbrellas at the ready. International programmes will start to arrive, we have <u>Open Days on</u> <u>26 & 27th June</u> (all welcome), and the spades go into the quad in early July, as the new library starts to become reality. The team are also busy planning events to mark the 50th anniversary of the arrival of women undergraduates, and the 150th anniversary of our refoundation. Alice in the library has asked me to remind students that we can post you books over the break.



As I write we are still drawing breath after a sensational two days launching the <u>Oxford Ministry for the Future</u>, with cli-fi author Kim Stanley Robinson, Doughnut

economist Kate Raworth, alumna Laline Paull, and cross discipline climate academics from across the University. This was a chance to challenge ourselves to think more boldly and imaginatively about our role in tackling the climate emergency. The video of the main Sheldonian event will be available soon. Huge thanks to Professor Anette Mikes for having conceived, curated, and energised this work. I have particularly enjoyed hearing from our academics about how their work – from using Al to map the world's water to enlisting beavers to cope with flooding to inventing new ways to organise a carbon economy – is making a practical difference. It was also great that our students and alumni were at the heart of the discussions, plus sustainability officers from business.



We have had plenty of other visitors this term, including William Hague, Will Hutton launching his powerful new book, 'This Time No Mistakes', alumnus Stuart Munsch (now running NATO Europe), and the President of Latvia. I'll be doing a Q&A with Rory Stewart on 19 June at the New Theatre.

For the second year, we celebrated Pride with breakfast in the quad and handed out over 1,000 rainbow ice creams in Catte Street. I learnt from students that my music taste is 'heritage gay'.

Summer VIIIs were superb once again. Thanks to all the alumni, tutors, staff and students who once again made the boathouse the liveliest on the river. I've just seen the Blades that will be awarded to our M2 boat, for the second year running. We are running out of walls to chalk: a great problem to have. Hertford are also mixed lacrosse champions for the first time in our history, and doing brilliantly in so many other sports.



At the end of May we said goodbye and a warm thank you to Frances Wheare as Development Director. Fran took over in the depths of lockdowns, a tough time to be asking for the money we vitally need. Among her many achievements were to increase the overall number of our donors by 20%, and to get the library campaign underway. Looking ahead, we have restructured the team, to separate alumni engagement/events and communications from fundraising. I am also delighted that <u>Professor Mike Wooldridge</u> has agreed to be Fellow for Development, providing real heft to the next phase of the effort to get ourselves onto a long term sustainable financial footing. The next two years are crucial.

I wrote in the last Bulletin about our useful interactions with the Charity Commission over governance. This has been a major focus of Governing Body's work this term, culminating in a very productive meeting with the Commission in May. We are making changes to the way we seek external and independent advice on risk, remuneration and audit. Thanks to alumnus Ciaran Martin for his help in our effort to ensure the most robust possible systems of governance.

You may have seen media coverage of Gaza protests in Oxford. At Hertford we have spent much of the term discussing practical ways we can support academics whose universities have been destroyed. Across our community there are strong views, and we have tried to listen and learn from each other. All common rooms have been firm in their rejection of antisemitism and islamophobia. As Deputy Chair of Conference, I've been part of the effort to ensure our core business of teaching and research can continue, and that the right to lawful protest is

protected. The college doesn't take positions on political issues, but you can follow in the media my personal views on the importance of a durable ceasefire and protection of civilians. Following debate with the students we have updated our ethical investment principles, and reviewed our portfolio to ensure that our investments do not breach our commitments on international law.



Last week Governing Body elected Athol Williams to an <u>Honorary Fellowship</u>. Athol is an extraordinary human – business leader, poet, ethicist, whistle blower and much more. We are very proud to have this association.

Congratulations to ... Students Iseult De Mallet Burgess for receiving the Oxford-BNU creative writing award, and Vit Ruzicka for being invited to speak at the inaugural TED AI Conference in Vienna this autumn; IT Officer Danish Raza on his MSc in Computer Science for Cybersecurity; and porter Franklin Nartey on his MPhil in Industrial and Organisation Psychology from the University of Ghana. Professor Bjarke Frellesvig has published a <u>Handbook of Historical Japanese</u> <u>Linguistics</u>, Dr Jieun Kiaer is <u>organising a K-pop extravaganza at the Sheldonian</u>, and Dr Federica Romei is about to address the world's top central bankers. Alum and former Obama adviser R. David Edelman has just published '<u>Rethinking Cyber</u> <u>Warfare</u>'.

Thanks to young alumni for a high energy London gathering last week. <u>Alumni</u> <u>lawyers gather next week</u>, with a great panel. I'm looking forward to welcoming home the <u>1980-82</u> and <u>2004-5</u> Gaudies in September.
