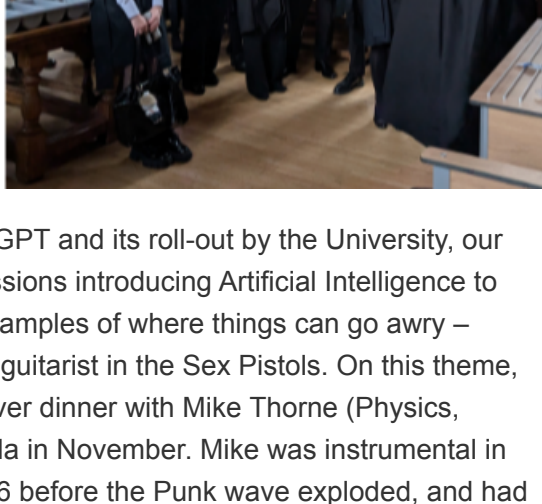


Dear Hertford Community,

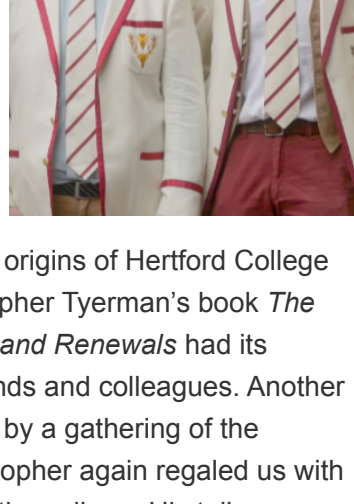
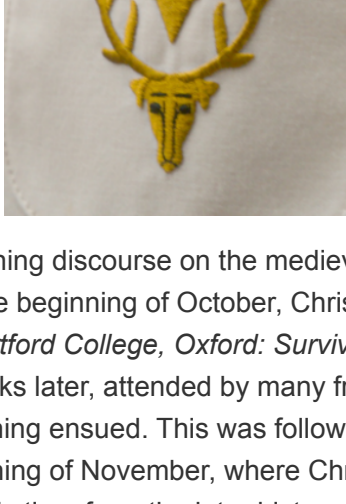
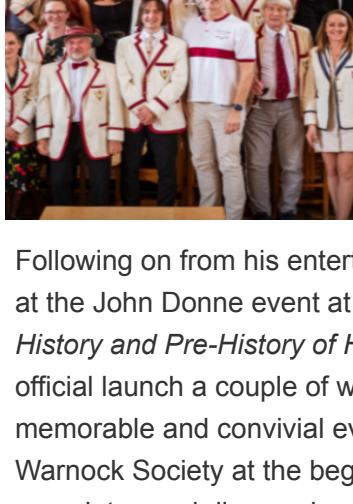

I am delighted that **Alexandra Freeman, Baroness Freeman of Steventon**, will become Principal of Hertford College in mid-March 2026. 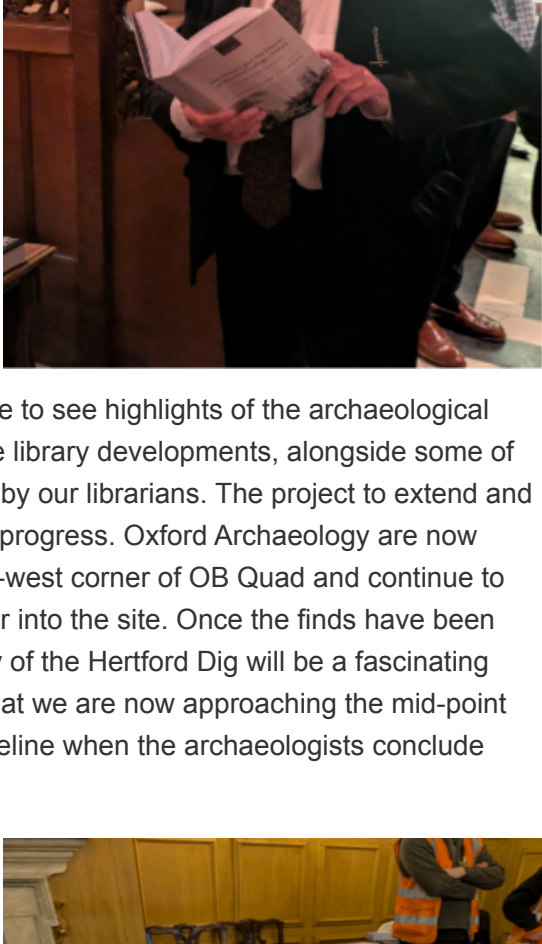


In response to the rapid development of ChatGPT and its roll-out by the University, our Senior Fellow Steve New ran a number of sessions introducing Artificial Intelligence to the new students, presenting well-received examples of where things can go awry – amongst them, entanglement with a one-time guitarist in the Sex Pistols. On this theme, it was a special pleasure for me to catch up over dinner with Mike Thorne (Physics, 1966) who visited the college with his wife Leila in November. Mike was instrumental in persuading EMI to sign the Sex Pistols in 1976 before the Punk wave exploded, and had a remarkable impact on the UK music scene. Mike and Leila's impact on the college has also been substantial, with generous support of bursaries and prizes in recognition of Neil Tanner's role in opening up Hertford to schools in the north-east of England.

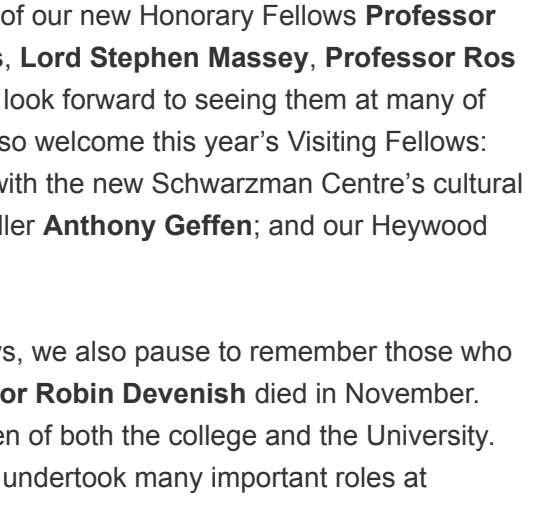
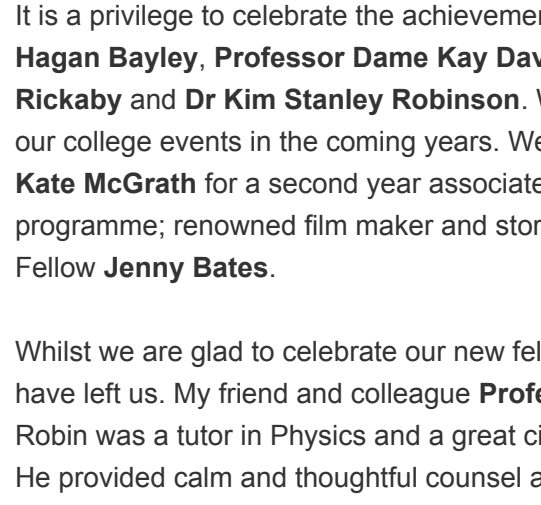

He, along with many other alumni, joined us in October for a rousing celebration of the 150th anniversary of the College Boat Club and 50 years of women rowing at Hertford. It was heartwarming to see so many former rowers and supporters returning to celebrate the club, including our world champions Paul Mattick and Steph Cullen and Olympic medallist Zoe Lee, as well as everyone who maintains a connection with this special part of our community. In addition to these important anniversaries, we also celebrated a remarkable 30-year record of excellent coaching by Graham Topping, and thanked all our supporters, and particularly Boris Tyzuek, who could not attend the event, but generously donated funding to enable current students and recent leavers to do so. Thankfully, river conditions have been kind this term and our new men's and women's crews have been able to participate in the novice regatta.



Following on from his entertaining discourse on the medieval origins of Hertford College at the John Donne event at the beginning of October, Christopher Tyerman's book *The History and Pre-History of Hertford College, Oxford: Survival and Renewals* had its official launch a couple of weeks later, attended by many friends and colleagues. Another memorable and convivial evening ensued. This was followed by a gathering of the Warnock Society at the beginning of November, where Christopher again regaled us with anecdotes and discoveries, this time from the later history of the college. His talk stimulated lively discussion over the lunch that followed.

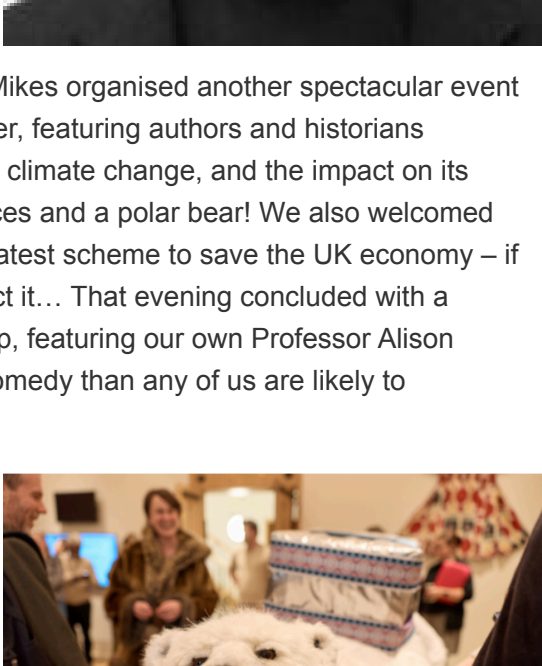
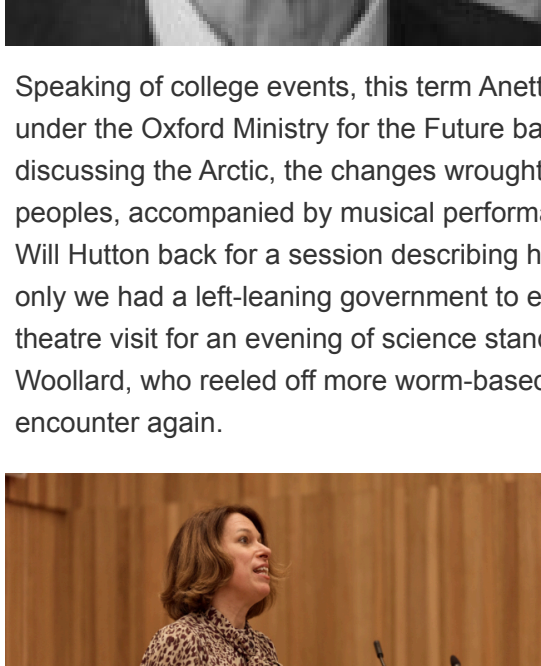


Later in November we enjoyed another chance to see highlights of the archaeological finds uncovered during the excavations for the library developments, alongside some of the early books from our collection, displayed by our librarians. The project to extend and redevelop the library continues to make good progress. Oxford Archaeology are now working underneath the buildings in the south-west corner of OB Quad and continue to find interesting artefacts as they burrow further into the site. Once the finds have been inspected, analysed and catalogued, the story of the Hertford Dig will be a fascinating companion to Christopher's book. We hope that we are now approaching the mid-point of the project, but will have a more secure timeline when the archaeologists conclude their work.

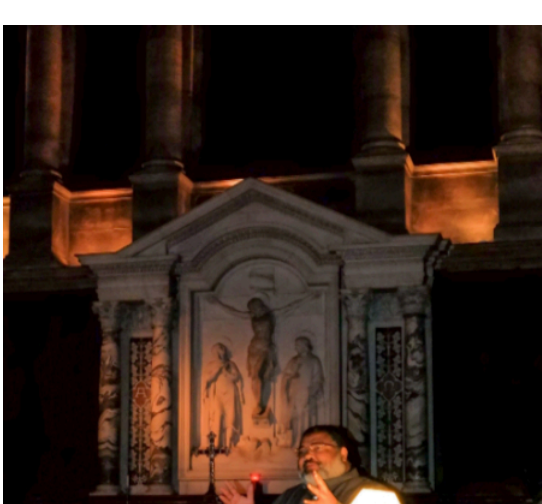
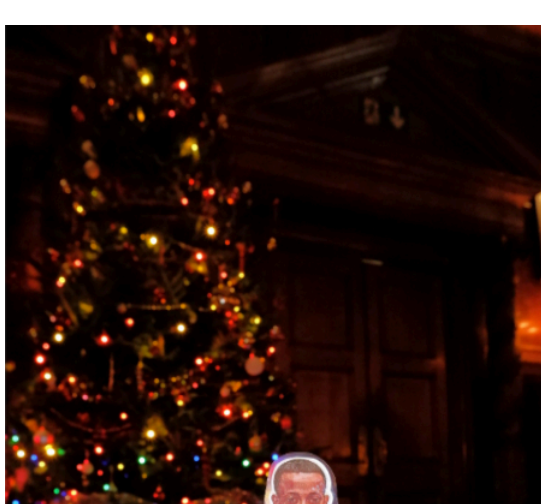

Alain Locke joined Hertford College in 1907 as the first African American Rhodes Scholar at Oxford.
